#### "My Worst Day Ever": A Narrative Essay of Lyla Morales, Grade 7 Student

**Appendicitis** is a serious medical condition in which the appendix becomes inflamed. It is a painful **inflammation** and infection of the appendix, a small, finger-shaped organ attached to the large intestine in the lower right abdomen. If not treated promptly, it can lead to a life-threatening infection of the abdominal cavity called *peritonitis*.

One Wednesday night (September 24, 2025), I started to feel a sharp pain in my lower right abdomen. The next day, we went to Cheyenne Mountain Zoo for our school field trip. Just as we were walking up the hill, I felt the pain again—the same sharp pain in my lower right abdomen. I decided not to continue because I couldn't bear it anymore. I met my dad, who came to assist me, and while we were walking back to the parking lot, we had to stop because the pain became unbearable. I even threw up because I also felt nauseous. My mom came and took me home to rest. I vomited for three days.

Then, on Sunday morning, I went to the bathroom, and to my surprise, I saw blood in my urine. I told my mom about it, so she rushed me to the hospital. There, they took my vitals and performed an ultrasound. After finding the cause of the pain, we were told to go to Children's Hospital in Briargate for surgery. When we got there, they put me in a room to relax for a bit. My mom and my aunt Marli were there, and later my dad, my two siblings, and our cousin Aby arrived too. My dad was really worried, and I think all of them were worried about my situation. Later, the nurses came in and took me for another ultrasound to see if my appendix was still intact. After that, they sent me back to my room, and we waited until around 4:53 p.m. for my surgery.

The medical staff brought me to the operating room and told my aunt and brothers to wait with my other family members. Only my mom was allowed to come with me. My dad left to finish his work so he could spend more time with me later. I got changed, lay down on the bed, and the anesthesiologist came to explain how my surgery was going to go. After that, the nurses and other medical staff brought me to the operating room. I was moved to the cold surgery table, and then I drifted off to sleep. When I woke up, I was in a new room and saw my cousin, my mom, dad, and aunt. We talked for a while, then everyone left except my mom. Later, my aunt Roxy, Alan, and Ethan came in, and we talked for a little while. My aunt and mom spent the night with me in the hospital.

I stayed in the <mark>hospital</mark> for three <mark>days. Eve</mark>ry day at 1<mark>2 a.m.,</mark> they would wake me up to check my vitals, and at 6 a.m., my doctors would come to check on me. At 12 p.m., they would check my vitals again.

On September 30, I woke up to see my grandpa's face. That day, I got permission to go downstairs to see my grandma. Chick-fil-A came to the hospital to cheer up the children, but sadly, not all the kids could come and see them. The mascots weren't allowed to go upstairs, but we still got some cool photos with them. On September 28, one of the doctors told me that I could go home, so at around 5:30 p.m., I said goodbye to the hospital and went home.

Having appendicitis is not a good experience. It's actually a very unpleasant and uncomfortable feeling. Thankfully, the surgery went well, so now I don't have to suffer from that anymore. There's no guaranteed way to avoid appendicitis; however, I would suggest maintaining a healthy lifestyle to help reduce the risk of getting it.

**Appendicitis** - a serious medical condition in which the appendix becomes inflamed and painful.

Inflammation - Inflammation is a protective response of the body to injury, infection, or other harmful stimuli. It involves the release of cells and chemicals that cause redness, swelling, pain, and loss of function.

**Ultrasound** - ultrasound is a medical imaging technique that uses high-frequency sound waves to create images of internal organs, tissues, and blood flow.

**Surgery** - procedure to remove or repair a part of the body or to find out whether disease is present. Also called operation.

Anesthesiologist - an anesthesiologist is a medical doctor who specializes in administering anesthesia to patients before, during, and after surgery to manage pain and ensure patient safety.
